

Heritage vs. Assets

- Heritage is a term often used for cultural artifacts that are thought permanent and publicly owned (financially or in mind).
- Asset is a term used for a commodity, which is privately owned and exploited in virtually any manner that may bring in a finacial profit.
- Ironically, in film heritage, there is an almost envious relationship, where assets strive to be heritage (art) and heritage is thought to be financially exploitable.



DFI Online Access

- Free online display (of low-res versions):
 - Public Domain
 - Possibly Public Domain
 - Orphan films (low risk: older than 50-70 years)
 - DFI owned films/assets
- Non-commercial VOD:
 - Government supported documentary films
 - Licensed educational films
- Not online:
 - Orphan works (newer than 50-70 years)
 - Unclear copyright
 - Commercially available films



What is at stake?

- European identity
- National identity
- Loss of history
- Loss of culture
- Loss of re-use income



The Potential?

- 21% of films in European film archives are estimated to be orphan films.
- Only popular feature films, new short fiction and new documentary films are readily available.
- Films on shelves may be valuable, but generate no additional value by being inaccessible.
- In Europe the public heavily supports the production, consumption, preservation and digitization of films.
- Open online visibility through heritage institutions could drive new cultural and commercial use.
